While the world has been going through a catastrophic health crisis due to COVID 19, social researchers (especially social anthropologists) have been affected enormously in multifarious ways as well. Ethnography (and in some cases participant observation), is a sine qua non to undertake research in social anthropology. Some of the researchers are facing impediments to go to the field

due to international border restrictions, others may be already in the field but are still unable to conduct their research due to government-imposed lockdowns. This is notwithstanding the fact that for a select few who still can get access to the field, the contagious nature of COVID 19 poses a huge threat to them and their interlocutors. The problem is even more intense for early career stage researches, (e.g., the ones in their PhD), who engage in timebound research.

The challenge for many researchers now is how to do their academic research 'work' despite not being able to physically access the 'field'? As the pandemic impedes into their fieldwork plans, the prospect of continued ethnographic research in the same vein seems uncertain. A growing number of medical experts and observers believe that we might never return to 'normal', leading many anthropologists to indicate that long-term 'traditional' fieldwork could become an impossibility in the coming years (Gökçe Günel, Saiba Varma, Chika Watanabe; 2020). To manage such a crisis during 'new-normal', anthropologists are gradually coming up with novel responses including 'patchwork ethnography' (Gökçe Günel, Saiba Varma, Chika Watanabe; 2020) and nuanced 'online ethnography' (Miller Daniel, 2020).

What is the aim?

This workshop proposes to address the challenges that the Pandemic unfurls for early career researchers in particular. It attempts to do so through the insights of expert social scientists who can throw some light and provide insights/resolutions to the impediments that researchers witness in their fieldwork. Its long-term goal is to build a cohort of the participating researchers who would continue to serve as a support group throughout their research period, even after the workshop is over.

Proposed Activities:

- a) The workshop aims to benefit through the lectures by experts who specialise in dealing with qualitative research. These lectures may shed light into: How to build rapport in the pandemic setting? How to engage in nuanced yet ethical research in online settings? How to 'participate' and 'observe' despite being physically absent from the lived realities of the field?
- b) Finding the way out: what are the alternative methods available to the researcher?
- c) How can the researcher plan to operationalise the available alternatives?
- d) If there a change of focus required (to a limited or large degree), how can the researcher visualise the change?
